
A Land Legacy: Cottonwood Cider House

Stacy Nelson-Heising and her family have quite an inspiring story. Tasked with finding a way to keep the family farm profitable and her dad's legacy of organic agriculture that gives back to the land more than it takes, they turned to a value-added approach. Along with her family, a lot of hard work, and some trial and error, Cottonwood Cider House in Ayr, ND was born in 2012. Just 7 years later Cottonwood has over 2,000 apple trees and over 40 varieties, not to mention, cherries and other fruits also incorporated into their hard ciders.

Most impressively, the orchard is certified organic. Nelson and family use manual pest management including "squishing tent caterpillars with their hands" and netting some, but not all, of their cherry trees. The trees are grown into alfalfa stands to encourage ever-so important pollinators and natural pest predators. Overall Nelson values the biodiversity on their orchard and she
