 How to Get Assistance from NRCS for Farms, Ranches and Forests

- 1 PLANNING**
 Visit your local NRCS field office to discuss your goals and work with staff on a conservation plan.
- 2 APPLICATION**
 With the help of NRCS, complete an application for financial assistance programs.
- 3 ELIGIBILITY**
 As part of applying, we'll file paperwork to ensure you're eligible for assistance.
- 4 RANKING**
 NRCS ranks applications according to local resource concerns.
- 5 IMPLEMENTING**
 Put conservation to work by signing a contract and implementing conservation practices.

Sand Ranch Pollinator Tour

On August 9th Cody Sand held a pollinator tour out at his ranch. There was roughly 20 people in attendance. It was a great morning for producers and others alike to see the difference the Sands Holistic Approach has done for the pollinators on his property.

“A couple things that really caught my attention: The quality of the forbs and grasses on lands that were grazed hard enduring the drought of 2017 but were scheduled to be rested during the 2018 season. The number of regal fritillary butterflies. The superb flavor of grass fed beef. The smiles on people who attended.

Things that didn't catch my attention: Many grassland nesting birds. Quality habitat generally had them out of sight. Quality shelter and space prevented us (potential predators) from seeing a lot of wildlife that was most certainly present.”

“I think another huge takeaway from the tour was that we had wildlife professionals and ranchers discussing land management together. Sometimes these are two groups that might not always see eye to eye or be interested in working together, but that certainly happened on the Sand's Ranch. Eco Ed

On September 25th the Logan County SCD hosted the Eco Ed 8th grade tour. Schools in attendance were Ashley, Wishek, Zeeland, Napoleon and Gackle. There was a total of 60 students that had lessons on Rangeland, Woodlands, Wetlands, Soils, and Water Quality. Each session was relatively hands on and interactive with the students. Prior to attending, each student had to take a test of questions. Then, upon completion of the sessions, they take a post-test that consists of the same questions as the pre-test. This is done to evaluate if students acquired new knowledge from the program. We are proud to say that we have noticed an increase in test scores! The students also received a goodie bag and a t-shirt the day of this event.

Minimum Qualifications: High School Diploma, experience in natural resources/agriculture, farming operations a must, familiar with Microsoft Word, Excel, and Power-Point, current driver's license, movement and lifting requirements, must be able to work independently, strong communication, interpersonal, and organizational skills required. Helpful if you have knowledge in Arc-GIS.

Winter Tree Care Tips:

- *Rake up and remove fallen leaves and debris that have accumulated around your trees.
- *Wrap the lower main stem of young trees to help protect their thin bark from winter damage such as scald, winter burn, and rodent damage.
 - *Prune any dead or damaged branches.
- *Watering in the fall is a great way to help trees survive the winter. Rule of thumb is to give 2 gallons of water per inch of stem diameter.
- * Make sure to clear off any dirt and debris that may have accumulated on your weed barrier fabric.
